

If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass, you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes in the Church, few parishes have any kind of dress code. Here, however, we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of reverence for the Blessed Sacrament. Please observe these minimum standards of dress for attendance at Church services:

- ## FEAST OF EPIPHANY
- The Feast of the Epiphany, celebrated on January 6th, is one of the oldest in the Church and one of the greatest in the ecclesiastical year. The word *Epiphany* is a Greek word which signifies a manifestation or revelation. During the first three centuries the manifestation of Christ to the chosen people, and His manifestation as the Savior of all races and nations, were celebrated on the same day, but since the 4th century, December 25th has been the feast of the Nativity, or Christmas, and January 6th the feast of the Epiphany, or the feast of the Three Kings. It is so-called because the Gospel of the day tells us that Wise Men, or Magi, came from the East to Jerusalem saying: "Where is He that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen His star in the East and we have come to adore Him."

PRAYER: *O God, who on this day revealed Thy Only-begotten Son to the Gentiles under the guidance of a star, mercifully grant that we who know Thee now by faith, may be led on even to look upon the beauty of Thy majesty. Amen.*
